Management Report of Fund Performance for the year ended March 31, 2019

INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE AND STRATEGIES

The investment objective of Sentry Global Tactical Fixed Income Private Pool (the Fund) is to generate income and the potential for long-term capital appreciation by investing primarily in a diversified portfolio of fixed-income securities of any credit quality, issued by companies or governments of any size, located anywhere in the world. The Fund's portfolio will include investment in fixed-income securities across different structures, sectors, currencies and countries. The Fund's investment style will emphasize flexibility and active management decisions in an attempt to maximize relative value for risk. The Fund's portfolio will also include investment in both investment grade and non-investment grade fixed-income securities including, but not limited to, sovereigns and quasi-sovereigns, corporate bonds and emerging market debt. The Fund will actively manage foreign currency exposure and has the ability to invest up to all of the Fund's assets in foreign fixed-income securities. RISK

No changes affecting the overall level of risk associated with investing in the Fund were made during the year. The risks of the Fund remain as discussed in the Fund's most recently filed simplified prospectus or its amendments. The Manager reviews the risk rating for the Fund on an annual basis, at a minimum, based on the methodology mandated by the Canadian Securities Administrators to determine the risk level of the Fund. Any change to the risk rating made during the year was as a result of such review and was not a result of any change to the investment objective, strategies or management of the Fund.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

The net asset value of the Fund decreased by \$0.3 million to \$3.6 million from March 31, 2018 to March 31, 2019. The Fund had net redemptions of \$0.2 million during the year. The portfolio's performance increased assets by \$0.1 million. The Fund paid distributions totalling \$0.2 million. Series A units returned 2.6% after fees and expenses for the one-year period ended March 31, 2019. Over the same time period, the Fund's benchmark returned 3.6%. The benchmark is the ICE BofAML Global Broad Market Total Return Index (50% CAD Hedged).

The performance of the Fund's other Series is substantially similar to that of Series A units, except for differences in the structure of fees and expenses. For the returns of the Fund's other Series, please refer to the "Past Performance" section.

The U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) pivoted abruptly on the direction of U.S. monetary policy in what became the defining action of the first quarter. In response to the financial market shocks of Q4, the Fed halted rate hikes indefinitely, averting a (potential) policy

error. Furthermore, the Fed is ending its balance sheet reduction earlier, and has brought renewed focus on correcting for past inflation shortfalls. Markets responded with a risk rally that recaptured the highs of October.

In spite of the credit and equity rally, government bond yields reached substantial new lows as anticipated hikes were repriced into rate cuts and recession fears emerged in response to weak growth data primarily in Japan and Europe. The lack of room for policy support sparked concern as the European Central Bank (ECB) postponed its plans to return rates to zero from negative territory.

Similarly, prospects for rate cuts from the Bank of Canada (BoC) took root in market pricing for the first time since 2016 amid lingering risks of renewed trade tensions and concerns of a global economic slowdown, to which Canada would not be immune.

Chinese stimulus progressed in measured fashion at the March National Party Congress where tax cuts and fiscal spending were announced, while further Chinese tariffs were postponed by the Trump Administration and meaningful negotiations appear to be progressing. The outcome helped ease concerns about a potential China hard landing that would accelerate the global economic downturn.

Emerging markets experienced strong inflows in equities and bonds as investors interpreted the dovish tack by the Fed as something that would quell volatility and U.S. dollar strength and, by extension, draw yield seeking investors back toward risk.

The Fund underperformed its benchmark during the year. The positive total return was primarily driven by a significant decline in interest rates, with further gains coming from an overweight stance in U.S. dollars, which strengthened 3.5% against the Canadian dollar.

Noteworthy in the investment-grade corporate portion of the Fund was the performance of the Celgene 3.45% 11, 2027 and Celgene 4.55% 02, 2048 bonds. These two securities produced total returns during the period of 10.6% and 13.9% respectively, on the news of Bristol-Myers Squibb's planned takeover of the company and contributed positively to the performance of investment-grade corporates within the Fund.

Returns, however, were negatively impacted by a widening of credit spreads over the reporting year, as financial conditions tightened, most notably in the U.S.

Detracting to performance, was the TransCanada FRN 2067 (US\$), which returned -4.7% over the year, as spreads widened while LIBOR rate expectations have fallen on the back of the dovish tilt from the Fed.

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The Fund remains overweight corporate credit - including investment grade and high yield, given the view that accommodative central bank policy across developed markets along with a moderate growth outlook should be supportive for credit spreads.

During the latter half of the reporting year, we tactically added to duration in the Canadian market by overweighing the 10-year sector of the curve at the expense of longer maturities. Our view was that a softening economic outlook domestically and abroad would drive the market toward completely pricing out further rate hikes by the BoC, thereby driving yields lower and the curve steeper.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS

After elevated volatility and tighter financial conditions to finish out 2018, global central banks, led by the Fed, now remain accommodative. Policy reassessment is underway with a pivot away from containing cyclical inflation to countering secular deflation. The powerful rally in government bond prices that ensued briefly pushed long-term bond yields below short-term bond yields - a so-called inversion of the yield curve. The extreme circumstance has prompted comparisons of global bond markets to Japan, particularly in the case of low-growth Europe.

Over the near-term, however, our view is that lower yields should serve as a stabilizing force for growth rather than a precipitator of a deflationary contraction.

Importantly however, funding channels remain open and real economic data is proving resilient, and even rebounding in China. The corporate bond market is much improved from last quarter with new issuance and inflows to the asset class. Our base case suggests further spread tightening is possible but coming from U.S. Treasury yields backing up slightly rather than price appreciation. Hence, the expectation for "clipping our coupon" from here will yield a respectable mid-single-digit return for the year with managed volatility.

The sharp repricing of rates across developed markets over the past few months has created opportunities for risky assets, leaving some room for credit spreads to narrow in the near term. As markets discount the end of Fed's hiking cycle alongside a slowing, but still growing above potential U.S. economy, the risk of weakness in the U.S. dollar begins to surface, which would in turn ease global and emerging market financial conditions in 2019.

New Accounting Standard – IFRS 9

Effective April 1, 2018, the Fund retrospectively without restatement adopted IFRS 9, *Financial Instruments* (IFRS 9). The new standard requires financial assets to be either carried at amortized cost or at fair value with changes in fair value recognized in profit and loss (FVTPL) or in other comprehensive income (FVOCI) based on the Fund's business model for managing financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. Upon transition to IFRS 9, the Fund's financial assets and financial liabilities previously designated as FVTPL or classified as held for trading under IAS 39, *Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement* (IAS 39) continue to be classified as FVTPL under IFRS 9. There were no changes in the measurement attributes for any of the Fund's financial assets and financial liabilities upon transition to IFRS 9.

On June 1, 2018, Sentry Investments Inc. amalgamated with CI Investments Inc. (CI) and Sentry Investments Corp. After the amalgamation, members of the Independent Review Committee (IRC) of the CI family of funds also became members of the Sentry Funds' IRC (together, the CI Funds IRC). Previous members of the Sentry Funds' IRC resigned on May 31, 2018.

On September 1, 2018, the Administration Fee proposal that was approved by unitholders during a special meeting held on May 3, 2018 came into effect. Effective September 1, 2018, CI Investments Inc. bears all of the operating expenses of the Fund (other than taxes, borrowing costs and new governmental fees) in return for the Administration Fee. Effective September 20, 2018, Tom Eisenhauer became a member of the CI Funds' IRC, and effective October 15, 2018, Mary Robertson resigned as a member of the CI Funds' IRC.

RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Manager, Portfolio Advisor and Trustee

CI Investments Inc. is the Manager, Portfolio Advisor and Trustee of the Fund. CI Investments Inc. is a subsidiary of CI Financial Corp. The Manager, in consideration for management fees, provides management services required in the day-to-day operations of the Fund. The Manager bears all of the operating expenses of the Fund (other than borrowing and interest costs, investor meeting costs (as permitted by Canadian securities regulation), the fees and expenses of the Independent Review Committee, the fees, costs and expenses associated with compliance with any new governmental and regulatory requirements imposed on or after February 16, 2018 and new governmental fees or with any changes to existing governmental and regulatory requirements imposed on or after February 16, 2018 (including increases to regulatory filing fees), any new types of costs, expenses or fees not incurred prior to February 16, 2018, including those arising from new government or regulatory requirements or related to those external services that were not commonly charged in the Canadian mutual fund industry as of February 16, 2018, and operating expenses that were or are outside the normal course of business of the Fund on or after February 16, 2018) in return for a fixed administration fee.

The Manager received \$0.04 million in management fees and \$0.01 million in fixed administration fees for the year.

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During the year ended March 31, 2019, the Manager of the Fund absorbed \$14,000 in management fees.

Management Fees

Approximately 27% of total management fees were used to pay for sales and trailing commissions. The remaining 73% of management fees were used to pay for investment management and other general administration.

Inter-Fund Trading

Inter-fund trading occurs when a Fund purchases or sells a security of any issuer from or to another Fund managed by the Manager. These transactions are executed through market intermediaries and under prevailing market terms and conditions. The Independent Review Committee reviews such transactions during scheduled meetings. During the year ended March 31, 2019 the Fund executed inter-fund trades.

Independent Review Committee

The Fund received standing instructions from the Fund's Independent Review Committee with respect to the following related party transactions:

- a) trades in securities of CI Financial Corp.; and
- b) purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager.

The applicable standing instructions require that related party transactions be conducted in accordance with the Manager's policies and procedures and that the Manager advise the IRC of any material breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that investment decisions in respect of related party transactions (a) are free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration relevant to an entity related to the Manager; (b) represent the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; (c) are made in compliance with the Manager's policies and procedures; and (d) achieve a fair and reasonable result for the Fund. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC on a quarterly basis to monitor compliance.

The Fund relied on the IRC's standing instructions regarding related party transactions during this reporting year.

Except as otherwise noted above, the Fund was not a party to any related party transactions during the year ended March 31, 2019.

(3) The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net assets during the year, including the Fund's proportionate share of such expenses of any underlying fund(s), if applicable.

(4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the fiscal year. The higher a Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a higher turnover rate and the performance of a Fund. Portfolio turnover rate is calculated by dividing the lesser of the cost of purchases and the proceeds of sales of portfolio securities for the year, and excluding cash and short-term investments maturing in less than one year, and before assets acquired from a merger, if applicable, by the average of the monthly fair value of investments during the year.

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
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PAST PERFORMANCE
