The charts below give you a snapshot of the fund's investments on June 28, 2019. The fund's investments will change.

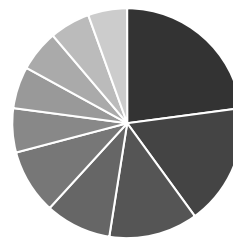

### How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

### Risk rating

CI Investments Inc. has rated the volatility of this fund as **medium**.

Generally, the rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

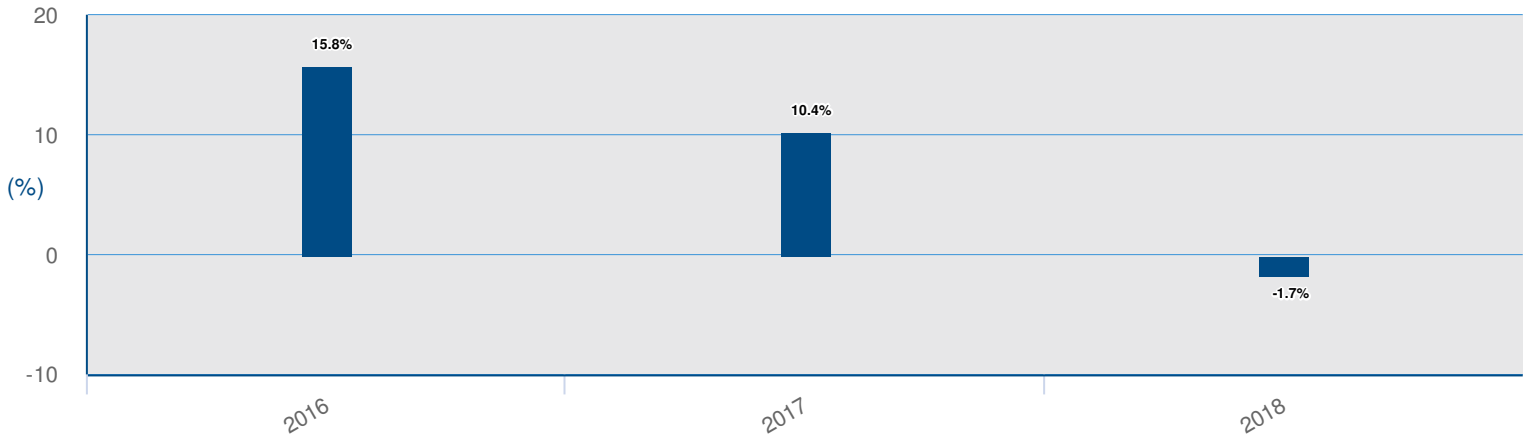
# Cambridge U.S. Dividend US\$ Fund (Class F units)

## How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Class F securities of the fund have performed over the past 3 calendar years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

### Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how Class F securities of the fund performed in each of the past 3 calendar years. This fund class dropped in value in 1 of the last 3 calendar years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



### Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for Class F securities of the fund in a 3-month period over the past 3 calendar years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

	Return	3 months ending	If you invested \$1,000 at the beginning of the period
<b>Best return</b>	7.9%	January 31, 2017	Your investment would be \$1,079.
<b>Worst return</b>	-2.0%	May 31, 2017	Your investment would be \$980.

### Average return

The annual compounded return of Class F securities of the fund was 8.0% since inception. If you had invested \$1,000 in the fund on the inception date, your investment would now be worth \$1,275.

## Who is this fund for?

### This fund may be suitable for you if you:

- hold your investment in a non-registered account and want direct exposure to securities that trade in U S dollars
- are seeking a core U.S. equity fund with the potential for long term growth
- are investing for the medium and/or long term
- can tolerate medium risk

## A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws of where you live and whether you hold the fund in a registered plan, such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.
