Management Report of Fund Performance for the year ended March 31, 2019

INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE AND STRATEGIES

The investment objective of Sentry Canadian Core Fixed Income Private Trust (the Fund) is to generate income and the potential for long-term capital appreciation by investing primarily in Canadian investment grade fixed-income securities and other debt instruments. The Fund will invest primarily in Canadian investment grade fixed-income securities with a credit rating of BBB or higher, but may also invest in floating-rate notes, preferred shares, convertible securities and other fixed-income debt instruments. The Fund has the ability to invest in foreign fixed-income securities in an amount not exceeding approximately 30% of the assets of the Fund. For a complete discussion of the Fund's investment objective and strategies, please refer to the Fund's most recently filed simplified prospectus.

RISK

No changes affecting the overall level of risk associated with investing in the Fund were made during the year. The risks of the Fund remain as discussed in the Fund's most recently filed simplified prospectus or its amendments. The Manager reviews the risk rating for the Fund on an annual basis, at a minimum, based on the methodology mandated by the Canadian Securities Administrators to determine the risk level of the Fund. Any change to the risk rating made during the year was as a result of such review and was not a result of any change to the investment objective, strategies or management of the Fund.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

The net asset value of the Fund decreased by \$65.2 million to \$289.6 million from March 31, 2018 to March 31, 2019. The Fund had net redemptions of \$73.3 million during the year. The portfolio's performance increased assets by \$18.5 million. The Fund paid distributions totalling \$10.4 million. Series I units returned 6.4% after fees and expenses for the one-year period ended March 31, 2019. Over the same time period, the Fund's benchmark returned 5.3%. The benchmark is the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Total Return Index.

During the year, strong U.S. economic growth helped to offset weakness in Europe and China. The U.S. Federal Reserve raised short-term interest rates by 100 basis points, while the Bank of Canada (BoC) raised its rate by 75 basis points. The United States imposed tariffs on Canada, China and other trading partners, which resulted in reciprocal tariffs. Volatility within the financial markets increased significantly during the second half of the period.

The Fund outperformed its benchmark during the year. An overweight allocation to credit contributed to the Fund's performance, as did its tactical duration (interest rate sensitivity) strategy. Individual contributors to performance included a floating rate perpetual security issued by U.S. bank, JPMorgan Chase & Co., and 407 International Inc. 3.6% May 21/2047. The JPMorgan holding benefited from a rising London inter-bank offered rate (LIBOR) in 2018. The 407 International infrastructure bond combined good operational metrics with a long duration, which added significantly to performance.

An underweight exposure to provincial debt detracted from the Fund's performance. Individual detractors from performance included a perpetual hybrid issued by TransCanada PipeLines Ltd. zero coupon, May 15, 2067.

We significantly reduced the Fund's credit exposure during the summer of 2018, moderately added to credit exposure during the fourth quarter, and trimmed credit exposure again in the first quarter of 2019. We added a new position in Bank of Montreal 4.338% Oct. 5, 2028, a tier 2, non-viable contingent capital security issued by the Canadian bank in U.S. dollars. An existing holding in floating rate perpetual security issued by JPMorgan was increased amid temporary price weakness. Encana Corp. 3.9% Nov. 15, 2021 was eliminated as crude oil rebounded in price. CHS/Community Health Systems Inc. 6.25% Mar. 31, 2023 was reduced on relative value.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS

We believe the Canadian economy will grow a little below its trend in 2019, but that the risk of recession is low. We expect that if the BoC raises interest rates again in 2019 by 25 basis points, it will likely be late in the calendar year. The Fund will maintain an overweight exposure to credit, and a modestly short duration (interest rate sensitivity) with a significant underweight exposure to the short end of the yield curve.

New Accounting Standard – IFRS 9

Effective April 1, 2018, the Fund retrospectively without restatement adopted IFRS 9, *Financial Instruments* (IFRS 9). The new standard requires financial assets to be either carried at amortized cost or at fair value with changes in fair value recognized in profit and loss (FVTPL) or in other comprehensive income (FVOCI) based on the Fund's business model for managing financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. Upon transition to IFRS 9, the Fund's financial assets and financial liabilities previously designated as FVTPL or classified as held for trading under IAS 39, *Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement* (IAS 39) continue to be classified as FVTPL under IFRS 9. There were no changes in the measurement attributes for any of the Fund's financial assets and financial liabilities upon transition to IFRS 9.

On June 1, 2018, Sentry Investments Inc. amalgamated with CI Investments Inc. (CI) and Sentry Investments Corp. After the amalgamation, members of the Independent Review Committee (IRC) of the CI family of funds also became members of the Sentry Funds' IRC (together, the CI Funds IRC). Previous members of the Sentry Funds' IRC resigned on May 31, 2018.

On September 1, 2018, the Administration Fee proposal that was approved by unitholders during a special meeting held on May 3, 2018 came into effect. Effective September 1, 2018, CI Investments Inc. bears all of the operating expenses of the Fund (other than taxes, borrowing costs and new governmental fees) in return for the Administration Fee. 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Effective September 20, 2018, Tom Eisenhauer became a member of the CI Funds' IRC, and effective October 15, 2018, Mary Robertson resigned as a member of the CI Funds' IRC.

RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Manager, Portfolio Advisor and Trustee

CI Investments Inc. is the Manager, Portfolio Advisor and Trustee of the Fund. CI Investments Inc. is a subsidiary of CI Financial Corp. The Manager, in consideration for management fees, provides management services required in the day-to-day operations of the Fund. The Manager bears all of the operating expenses of the Fund (other than borrowing and interest costs, investor meeting costs (as permitted by Canadian securities regulation), the fees and expenses of the Independent Review Committee, the fees, costs and expenses associated with compliance with any new governmental and regulatory requirements imposed on or after February 16, 2018 and new governmental fees or with any changes to existing governmental and regulatory requirements imposed on or after February 16, 2018 (including increases to regulatory filing fees), any new types of costs, expenses or fees not incurred prior to February 16, 2018, including those arising from new government or regulatory requirements or related to those external services that were not commonly charged in the Canadian mutual fund industry as of February 16, 2018, and operating expenses that were or are outside the normal course of business of the Fund on or after February 16, 2018) in return for a fixed administration fee.

Inter-Fund Trading

Inter-fund trading occurs when a Fund purchases or sells a security of any issuer from or to another Fund managed by the Manager. These transactions are executed through market intermediaries and under prevailing market terms and conditions. The Independent Review Committee reviews such transactions during scheduled meetings. During the year ended March 31, 2019 the Fund executed inter-fund trades.

Independent Review Committee

The Fund received standing instructions from the Fund's Independent Review Committee with respect to the following related party transactions:

- trades in securities of CI Financial Corp.; and
- purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager.

The applicable standing instructions require that related party transactions be conducted in accordance with the Manager's policies and procedures and that the Manager advise the IRC of any material breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that investment decisions in respect of related party transactions (a) are free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration relevant to an entity related to the Manager; (b) represent the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by

considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; (c) are made in compliance with the Manager's policies and procedures; and (d) achieve a fair and reasonable result for the Fund. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC on a quarterly basis to monitor compliance.

The Fund relied on the IRC's standing instructions regarding related party transactions during this reporting year.

Except as otherwise noted above, the Fund was not a party to any related party transactions during the year ended March 31, 2019.

The Effective HST tax rate is calculated using the attribution percentage for each province based on unitholder residency and can be different from 13%.

(3) The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net assets during the year, including the Fund's proportionate share of such expenses of any underlying fund(s), if applicable.

(4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the fiscal year. The higher a Fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a higher turnover rate and the performance of a Fund. Portfolio turnover rate is calculated by dividing the lesser of the cost of purchases and the proceeds of sales of portfolio securities for the year, and excluding cash and short-term investments maturing in less than one year, and before assets acquired from a merger, if applicable, by the average of the monthly fair value of investments during the year.

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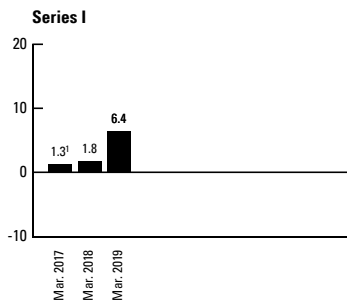
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PAST PERFORMANCE

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Annual Compound Returns

The following table shows the Fund's annual compound returns for each year indicated, compared to the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Total Return Index.

The FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index is a market capitalization weighted index that measures the performance of the Canadian investment-grade fixed income market. The Index consists of fixed rate bonds denominated in Canadian dollars, with a remaining effective term to maturity of at least one year, rated BBB or higher. The Index is comprised of four main credit or borrower categories: bonds issued by the Government of Canada (including Crown Corporations), Provincial bonds (including provincially-guaranteed securities), Municipal bonds and Corporate bonds. The Corporate sector is further divided into sub-sectors based on major industry groups: Financial, Communication, Industrial, Energy, Infrastructure, Real Estate and Securitization. The Corporate sector is also divided into sub-indices based on credit rating: a combined AAA/AA sector, a single A sector and a BBB sector.

A discussion of the performance of the Fund as compared to the benchmark is found in the Results of Operations section of this report.
